From the Founder



Lucy's Long Journey Home

I had almost given up. After years of planning and permits. After Violeta passed away. After commitment dates came and went. After flight details kept changing. I thought Lucy would spend the rest of her days in Argentina in the cage she had lived in most of her life. She was the last remaining tiger at the Mendoza Zoo.

I have never been so happy to be wrong!

With winter approaching, Lucy aging and health declining, I had to set an ultimatum date. It was October 10th. And you guessed it, that's the day she landed in New York City.

I anticipated meeting Lucy for the first time so much. I was excited, but also anxious. It was a long trip and based on new airline guidelines, her transport crate was very long and skinny. Not nearly as spacious as the Argentina lions arrived in.

I knew it would be hard on her arthritis. I was also worried that her kidneys might fail during the trip. We were given blood work results, but it was from a year prior. We requested it upon loading, but the zoo worked on coaxing Lucy in her crate awake, so they weren't able to draw blood.

We did find out some good news. Her origination paperwork confirmed she was younger than previously thought—only 16. Yet her body and her arthritis depict a different story, possibly from living life in a small area and on hard substrate.

Meeting Lucy

Seeing her was a sight for sore eyes. She was calm and regal. But she also had a dry coat, looked dehydrated and was a little distant. We knew getting her back to the sanctuary was best for her.

As we drove through the city, in traffic on the final leg of her trip to sanctuary, I looked out the van window and thought, “Wow, I bet no one has any idea we have a tiger in our vehicle.” But then I started to wonder, “If we had a tiger, what might be in all the other vehicles?” I giggled to myself.

Lucy was wonderful during the road trip. As each hour passed, Lucy engaged more and more. She drank water at each stop and, midway through the trip, began to eat. But the last few stops, she was up waiting for us when we opened her panel to give her water.

Safe at Sanctuary

I was so relieved to see her brighter and alert as we reached the sanctuary grounds.

Then, it was time to unload her after her 7,200-mile trip. What would she think touching grass for the first time? Lucy left her transport crate right away and began to explore. She walked through the tall grass once, shook her paws, and then stayed on the mowed paths and concrete that outlined the perimeter of her habitat.

She walked right up to the shared wall and saw tiger Pandora and gave out her first chuff. I was in tears. She was calm and confident at first but, as the day went on, she became a little more reserved as she saw lions Alana and Aurora across the way.

Within a few days, she'd settled in. She feels safety amongst humans and approaches her habitat wall with a lot of moans and vocalization as she rubs along the fence and drops to the ground waiting for the audience to fawn over her. Which of course we do.

She's much smaller in stature than our other tigers and a much darker color orange. She is beautifully Lucy.

Lucy's Future

As happy as I am that she gets to live the remainder of her days at sanctuary, I'm concerned with how many days that may be. Lucy's age, GI concerns and arthritis in her elbow all contribute to my concern.

We've already begun her pain management plan, as well as a monthly injection of solensia—a new medication for feline arthritis. It costs about \$80 a month for a domestic cat and Lucy's starter dose is \$200 a month. But it will go up to \$600 a month if she continues to accept the injection and we administer a full dose.

Lucy has already had her intake exam, CT scan and endoscopy to help us create a medical plan to give her as much support as possible.

Lucy's rescue and medical care is costly. But for her to get to experience being a tiger in a natural area for the first time in 16 years is priceless.

She was wrongly sentenced to life in a zoo. So, no matter how much time she has left, we felt she deserved to know freedom. Thank you for feeling the same way and supporting us in cases like this. An international case years in the making for a single senior tiger. Every life matters. Lucy and I both thank you!

Catio Town – A True Fantasy Land



What a surreal day when the first rescued hybrid cats moved into their Catio Town suites. Catio Town is truly a fantasy land for small cats. You feel pure joy as you walk through the doors into the bright central hall and look around at all the beautiful lives we've saved.

What started as a dream over a year ago is now a reality, thanks to so many generous supporters!

Our goal was to provide a better life for the cats we rescue. But we also wanted a unique way to bring awareness to the Small Cat Crisis on social media. Who wouldn't want to tune in to see rescued cats, who were once in threat of euthanasia, now living their best lives here in Catio Town?

I'm so excited to share photos of this special space and those who enjoy it! And Catio Town is much more than a fun place for the cats to live.

- It provides year-round dynamic space for the cats both in their temperature-controlled suites and covered outdoor catios.
- Streamlines and decreases caretaker time for cleaning and maintenance which increases

the amount of love and attention for the cats who want it.

- This cool new space will be a marketing catalyst to further small cat crisis education.
- Catio Town features 10 heated, indoor suites with outdoor access for the cats, too. Attached outdoor areas are furnished with skywalks, water fountains and cat grass beds.
- There's a central playroom to conduct playdates and give the cats even more socialization.
- The building is mirrored after our big cat buildings with angled floors to central drains, epoxy walls for easy cleaning, an air exchanger for fresh and clean air indoors.
- Solatubes were installed in the atrium to bring as much natural sunlight inside for the cats to enjoy.

Each indoor room has its very own individualized theme with adorable, customized amenities. For instance, the Under The Sea room features walls full of fish and turtle shelves for the cats to perch on. The Log Cabin room, decked out with cute plaid accessories, has its very own

faux fireplace. The PAWSH room showcases a totally modern décor, and there's even a tribute to Barbie with a pink Dream House.

We were the first sanctuary specializing in rescuing the smaller wildcats—including hybrids. This is truly the first of its kind for wild/domestic hybrid cats. Catio Town will provide a forever home to current and future small and hybrid cats who can't otherwise be rehomed due to legalities and unwanted behaviors.

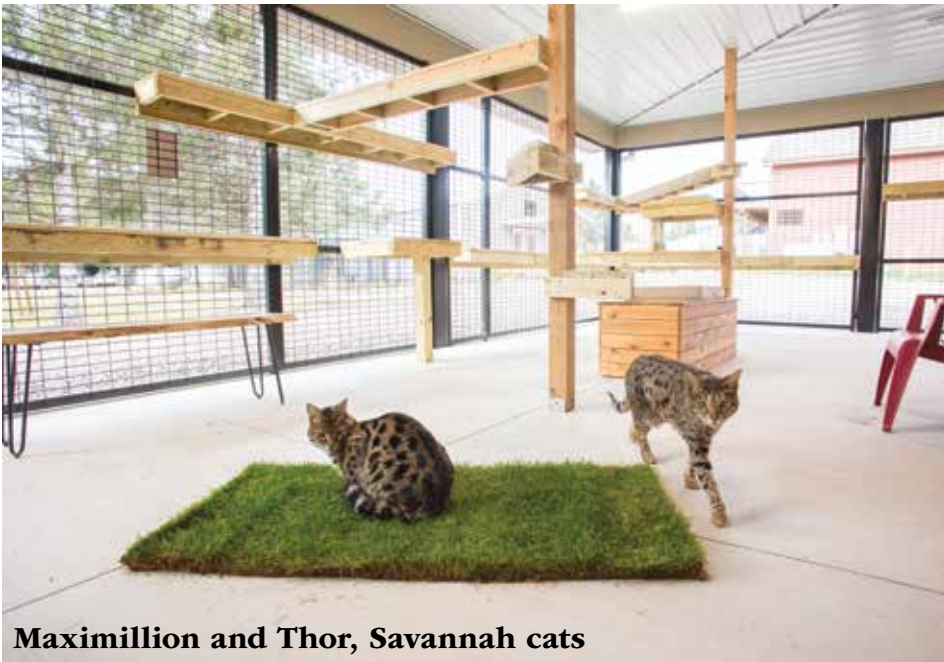

2024 Impact Report

I'm overwhelmed with gratitude as I look at all we accomplished together this past year! Because of YOU, the sanctuary is never status quo. We continue to expand, enhance habitat features, educate more people about the captive wildlife crisis, and ensure every day is the best day for the cats we care for.

Our Sanctuary

- We **acquired 120 adjacent acres!** This provides a natural safety buffer, provides a home to wild bobcat, bear, fisher and other wildlife. And it gives us room to dream big!
- We built **new habitats** to accommodate **more rescues**.
- The perimeter fence was moved back several hundred feet to build the new **Cattail Creek area that includes 7 habitats**.
- **Four habitats were constructed.** Two for bobcats and one with a waterfall for our Fishing Cat, Sushi. All included caves, skywalks, boulders and temperature-controlled buildings.
- Completion of **5,400 sq. ft. Catio Town** building for Bengals and hybrids, including emergency generator.
- Prior to construction, **temporary areas were built** for 40 hybrids and 6 bungalow sheds and yards were demolished.
- Installed, furnished and ran heat/electric to **4 new bungalows** in hybrid and small cat areas.
- Welcomed **23 new residents** and said good-bye to 11 special wild ones.
- Added **2 Pavilions** for our staff, volunteers and donors.
- **Rebuilt the roof** of the 7,000 square foot habitat for cougars Rainier, Tacoma and Quincy.
- Removed and donated the **old bunkhouse** that was no longer needed.
- Installed a **new roof** on one of the intern houses in downtown Sandstone.

Our Industry

- National recognition for our **Small Cat Crisis Campaign**. We have not only educated lawmakers and the general public, but our animal rescue partners, too. Now, sanctuaries and animal welfare organizations have all begun to educate and help save the smaller cats and hybrids.
- Our Executive Director serves on the Board of the **Big Cat Sanctuary Alliance** and is the Rescue Committee Chair. Our Donor Services Manager served on the conference committee.
- We were one of the first sanctuaries to join the **Wildlife Confiscation Network**. The purpose of the WCN is to create a coalition of reputable and trusted animal care facilities who can provide immediate medical care and housing for wildlife that are trafficked through U.S. ports of entry, allowing wildlife law enforcement to concentrate on their core functions: the investigation and prosecution of criminals.
- Our team participated in several **industry conferences** to share the work of our sanctuary, educate about the Small Cat Crisis, discuss solutions to zoo surplus, and network about best practices for the species in our care. These included PAWS International Captive Wildlife Conference, Felid Taxonomic Advisory Group, Cheetah Husbandry Conference and Big Cat Sanctuary Alliance conference.

Our Volunteers

We're honored to have talented and compassionate people supporting our staff and the animals. The hours our volunteers contribute is remarkable and so very appreciated!

- **AmeriCorps** put in eight weeks of project work here on-site that amounted to **2,240 hours!** Seven people for 2 months working 40 hours/week.
- **Crew Days** were up in both amount and participation, accounting for **1,758 volunteer hours** or 43 Crew Days with 293 participants (compared to 31 Crew Days in 2023 with 236 participants).
- Our volunteer team hours were just under **2,400 hours**, up almost 200 hours from 2023! Our volunteers help with events, outreach, gardening/grounds work, chores and cleaning, construction and even vet techs volunteering their time in the hospital.
- Our **5 development volunteers** donate the time of **2.5 full-time staff!**

Plans for 2025

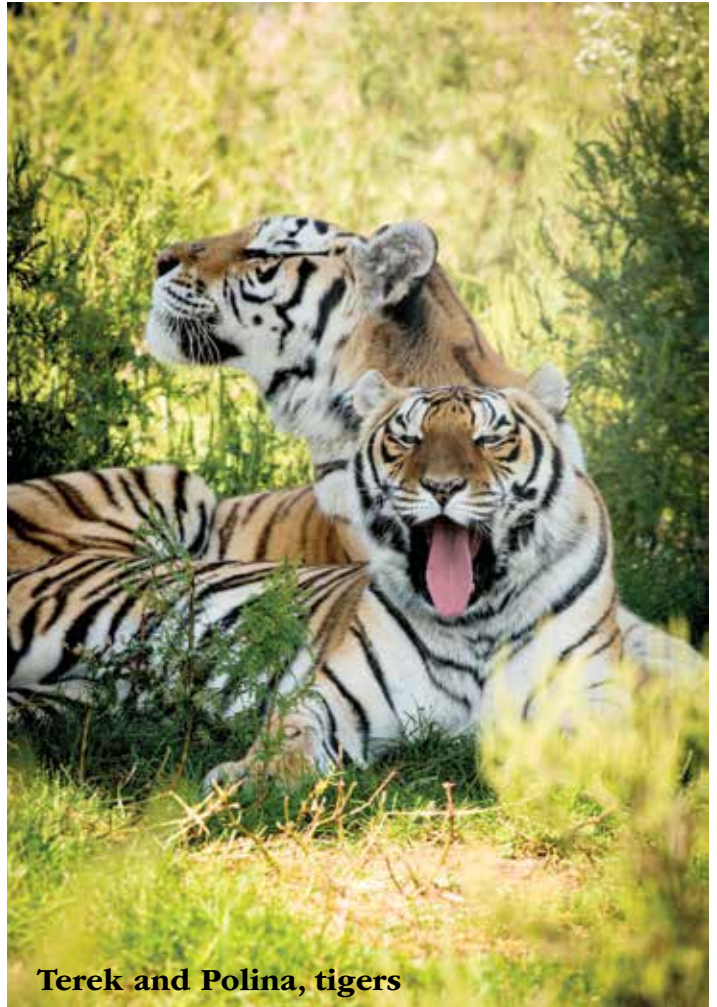
We are always improving our facilities for our staff and cats in order to provide the best care and meet our mission goals.

The Sanctuary

- Build a roofed **habitat to accommodate leopards/cougars/jaguars** with heated building in Cattail Creek.
- Install a **new well** near Cattail Creek to service this area and Wild Woodlands.
- **Rebuild 1-2 habitats** in Roar Ridge to provide more habitat space, as well as accommodate the new septic tank.
- Install **large rock caves** in up to 4 large cat habitats.
- Install **shift yards** in up to 4 large cat habitats to increase options for cleaning/maintenance.
- Add a **road and culvert** between the top and lower Cattail Creek to connect the two areas.
- **Upgrade all internal roads** to ensure easy and emergency access to all cat areas.
- **Tear down old hybrid quarantine** that is no longer needed.
- Install a **new barrier fence** around Small Cat Track.
- **Replace roofs** on aging buildings, such as quarantine pole shed, Serval Building and Roar Ridge.
- **Replace 2 boilers** in animal care buildings to decrease breakdowns and increase efficiency.
- **Purchase 1 UTV, 1 golf cart, 2 zero turn lawnmowers, skid steer** attachment to support daily operations.
- Repair **2 big cat pools** in time for summer use.

- Invest in a new Customer Relationship Management (CRM) **database** to better customize the donor's experience.
- Develop plan and estimates for **workshop, utilities, and fencing** to be built in 2026.
- Create a **short- and long-term plan** for the newly acquired 120 acres.
- Review and update **5-year strategic plan**.
- **Expand our leadership and onsite management** to ensure successful long-term succession.
- **Invest in our staff** by adding additional benefits such as short/long term disability and life insurance.
- Fund and host an **onsite working group of sanctuary veterinarians** to inspire collaboration on sanctuary medicine.
